THE QUENTESSENTIAL TEACHER -

In my entire teaching career, one commonality that I have realized is the reluctance on the part of most students to attend parent-teacher meetings. The rate of absenteeism has been pretty high for children who have had disruptive classroom behavior.

On the day of PTMs, I am normally flooded with complaints about children- both by their parents and teachers which start with words lik "disengaged", "disenchanted", "disruptive", "unmotivated", etc. Use of such words often does more harm than good is a stated fact. Howeve here we will ponder over and address the "Why" of disruptive behavior and the "How" of the solutions to the same. I know the situation is a complete despair for any educator to deal with. For the student the disruptive behavior is actually an outcome of a challenging situation which he/she is unaware of how to deal with.

For teachers to tackle this disruptive behavior or "giving up" attitude of students requires a lot of ability in making task relevant for the students. First and foremost it is a non-negotiable to label a child as a non-performer or disinterested. Second don't be didactic, "do this...or else...". Threatening postures often don't work. Next address the problem in collaboration by spending time on why he does what is not expected of him. Then derive solutions together. Once solutions are found they need to be converted into habits. And lastly show empathy as it is the most important step in turning around a challenging behavior to a more acceptable behavior.






MEET THE PRINCIPAL - MR. VAIBHAV KAPOOR

"Could you narrate an instance from your profession that has stayed with you throughout your teaching career?"



THE VIRTUAL CLASSROOM - ROLE OF THE EDUCATOR




