

As educators we spend hours and hours in planning the effective delivery of the curriculum which begins much before the start of the session. Rushing from one class to the other we are often caught up in the procedures, activities and schedules navigating our day rigorously through the time table. understanding our students, their aspirations, their needs and the challenges they might face takes a back seat in the rigor of syllabus completion, assessments, note book marking. The result is we often face challenges managing our students resulting many a times in utterchaos and disruption of learning.

Classroom management has been primarily focused on discipline and placing the primal role on a teacher to be strict and tough on her students, it is somewhat difficult to incorporate such methodologies but a beginning step to efficient classroom management is open mindedness to approach situations, to look at every student as a genius and help them give that environmentto shine without disturbance. Efficient classrooms create efficient learners As an educator it is essential to understand that students coming to a classroom bring with them their unique identities developed in distinct social backgrounds which often creates a dynamic social environment which requires a close observation and understanding on the part of the educator. Classrooms are spaceswhere the magic of learning and the wonder of exploring come together. Classrooms act as foundation builders for every facet of life. The most important contributing factor to help build this strong foundation is efficient classroom management.

When we think about classroom management, the first thing that comes to mind is discipline but classroom management is so much more than that. 


Day 5: Stress & Time Management


CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT IN VIRTUAL EDUCATION

With the onset of online classes as a result of the pandemic, the world of education has witnessed a sea change. What was unthought-of earlier in the teaching-learning process has now become a way of life with students across the globe who have taken to the online platform like being experts in the field, while teachers are updating themselves

with the latest in technology to ensure effective learning. The transition from classroom learning to an online platform has been rather smooth and while the rest of the world faced a lockdown, keys to learning were unlocked.

While learning continues, it is classroom management that appears at the forefront and poses several questions. How can a teacher manage a classroom on a virtual platform? What assurance does a teacher have thatstudents are actually attentive? Is online learning as effective as it is in a traditional classroom? However, these questions have been put to rest asteachers have cut across barriers and overcome challenges, to successfully manage their students by engaging them in learning through innovative strategies. The connection that was created during the normal school days is now being put to good use, and through the distance, the bond that the teachers nurtured with their students has not been allowed to loosen up amidst the unfavourable tides. With a plethora of tools that technology offers classrooms are being managed even more effectively byengaging the students in group discussions through the break-out rooms, where students can collaborate and even socialize, screen sharing to display concepts, chatbox usage to enable students ask queries and answer questions, hand raising to enable students to draw the attention of the teacher without disturbing the class, and the mute/unmute button thatenables the teacher to manage the speaking of students in turns - the classroom is being successfully managed. CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT

From your teaching experience how would you define classroom management? According to you, what does a well-managed classroom look like?

Classroom management is how a teacher organizes the resources to make teaching and learning effective in a proficient manner. A well-managed class is where all the students are positively and enthusiastically engaged in learning activities, a class where they are given freedom to express themselves without any restrictions, where they are given a free platform to express their grievances and are given opportunity to solve the conflict.

Do you think classroom management is all about discipline or is it also about inclusion/conflict resolution and teamwork?

Effective classroom management begins with relationship building. When students feel a greater sense of belongingness, they are more likely to exhibit a positive behaviour. As a teacher I always used to make rules with students who were then asked to observe them, keeping in mind their varied attributes. This initiative gave them a clear vision to display an expected behavior. Students feel more interested in their learning if given the opportunity to share their interests. Thus discipline is achieved once students are engaged and feel empowered whether it is resolution of a conflict or sharing a thought with a team member.

How do you think teachers could support in the empowerment and instilling self discipline in students?

Teachers can sometimes leave the center stage, be supportive, and listen. A good teacher should always give positive reinforcement, reflective listening, expression of enthusiasm, and an environment to help students to grow holistically. When a teacher focuses on the positive conduct, disruptive behavior is stemmed before it becomes an issue in the class. Negative interaction can weaken a teacher-student relationship. If it is left unaddressed, students will be less willing to participate in classroom activities. They may also be more likely to misbehave.

As an educator, how did you create an engaging classroom?

I, as a teacher used to ensure that all the students participate in either an indoor or an outdoor activity. Students were assigned jobs according to their interests. With a positive push they were made to believe in themselves that they can do it competently. This used to instill confidence in them, which was reflected in their learning also.

Any talk on education is incomplete without the discussion on experiential learning. Do you think the traditional classroom should be replaced with experiential learning? Today, experiential learning is essential to prepare the students for their goal setting. Experiential learning helps them identify their interests. Once they know their interests, goal setting becomes easy. This is the need of the hour. Our traditional classroom culture needs a paradigm shift; hands on experience will induce self confidence and pave the way for effective goal setting for the future.


How can the present-day classrooms be transformed into a productive place for teaching and learning, where students explore possibilities?

Today, a classroom is expected to be a place where an environment should exist which shapes the student's personality, character and future. Poor school performance can be avital reason for low self esteem which shall further lead to mental and physical health issues. There should be an environment of maximum learning time, no wastage of time oninstructions which can not be understood by students, rather simple and clear instructions with ample activities. Student-centered group activities, innovative and research based knowledge sharing should be part of daily knowledge programs.

Your mantra for successful classroom experience.

Being available to students in case of difficulty, but no spoon feeding, encouragement to students to participate, positive compliments are a few techniques for resourceful and maximum learning. I believe that for best results, 'Win the trust of your students, listen tothem, own them, respect their identity and feelings, keep their secrets, give a safe and happy environment and also be open for feedback.' The careers which students pursue give a sense of satisfaction to you, especially when your students acknowledge and appreciate you years later. That's when you, as a teacher achieve success; your job is done



EDUCATOR OF THE MONTH

1. As a people manager, you can assess the potential of educators in various sectors. What would you like to say to our young educators so that they build themselves a strong foundation to their career in education?

India is a teacher-deficient country, from early childhood to the University level. Sounds a bit odd considering that we have a large pool of employable youth and that we have a long tradition of imparting knowledge. The goal of achieving quality education can be driven only by a dedicated team of teachers. India deserves a long pipeline of teachers voluntarily entering the profession as their first career option. Once a teacher is in the profession, their growth, learning and in-service education is the responsibility of the organization. Every teacher has her first day. The school leaders and mentors should help them to be first-rate teachers throughout their career. Teaching is unlike any other career. Purpose of transforming young children to become productive, caring, innovative citizens must be backed by a passion. Youngsters entering the profession today have to be co-learners, mentors and collaborators.

2. You have been a curious child, which has inspired you to reflect as an educator in a better way. What role do you think curiosity plays in the career of a student?

We have subjected learners into passivity for a long time. The late Sir Ken Robinson famously and controversially said, "the schools kill creativity." We do not encourage questioning. The so-called dumb questions lead to path-breaking innovations. The classrooms, therefore, need a redesign to elicit students' love for learning and self - development. The pedagogy must shun predictability and encourage curiosity, innovation, and active participation. Trusting a child's potential, quenching her curiosity and being ever eager to lend her support builds confidence and competency. How do we build curiosity? Children are naturally inquisitive. Educators must support to develop their creative capacities. Examples to ignite their minds, allowing them to mess around and make mistakes, reflection, teacher's participation as a collaborator are useful strategies. Surprisingly all these strategies are deployed by Kindergarten teachers. Sadly as the children grow the spiral of creativity shrinks. Our thoughts about children, their attitudes and inclinations must be central to our reflective process.

3. What role does a teacher play in creative and collective problem-solving in a classroom environment?

Teachers, like any other professional, need inspiration and role-models. The principal of a school is in the best position to fit in this role. Principals must bring the essential resources, expertise and experts, research findings for the benefit of the teachers. Effective teachers are quick to identify the reasons for disengagement some children exhibit. Often, shyness, lack of confidence, fear of public exposure and some behavioural issues are more significant impediments to learning than cognitive challenges. Teacher's ability to communicate in a way that makes complicated things simple is a test of effectiveness. Learners see in their teachers an equal partner. Task-oriented activities, incentivizing learning and active involvement of teachers make learning exciting. No wonder sports teachers are so much popular with their teams. If subject teaching also becomes a play and teachers join the students, results are astonishing. How we judge the learning and ability to learn has a significant bearing on a child's future.

4. How do you view the Indian education system after the implementation of New Education Policy- 2020?

The announcement of the policy should be seen as a momentous occasion in our country's history. It is an outcome of a deliberate, consultative exercise to give a framework to ensure human flourishing, character building and human capital formation. It is hoped that the NEP2020 catalyses the community to view education as a shared asset, an instrument for accelerating skill, nation-building, and an end in fulfilment and sustainability. We can change the face of education if the policy is implemented in full force with bipartisan agreement, generous funding, digital equity and people's participation. However, it cannot be a business as usual in the classrooms. We cannot afford to be the disseminators of information demanding from learners to consume and reproduce. I am foreseeing learners indulging in creative solutions, strategizing and dealing with dilemmas. Teachers must happily support as course designers spectating an unfolding low-chaos drama in the classrooms. Education as an instrument of lifelong learning is another outcome on the horizon.
